Duke University Press announces three additions to its journals list: *Small Axe*, *Novel*, and *Comparative Literature*

Duke University Press announced today the addition of three new titles—*Small Axe: A Caribbean Journal of Criticism*, *Novel: A Forum on Fiction*, and *Comparative Literature*—to its 2009 journals list. These acquisitions represent a change in publisher only; the editorial offices and editorial directions of each of the journals will remain unchanged. Existing subscribers to these titles will receive information from Duke University Press regarding the transfer of their subscriptions in coming months.

Small Axe: A Caribbean Journal of Criticism publishes critical work—scholarly articles, opinion essays, interviews, works of fiction and poetry, and visual arts—that examines the ideas that have guided Caribbean modernities. Previously published by Indiana University Press, *Small Axe* will be published by Duke University Press starting with the February 2009 issue (volume 13, issue 1, #28). The journal will be included in the e-Duke Journals Scholarly Collection at no additional cost to collection subscribers.

Published by Brown University for forty years, *Novel: A Forum on Fiction* is dedicated to promoting critical discourse on the novel and publishes new and significant work on fiction and the related areas of research and theory. Duke University Press will begin publishing *Novel* with the Spring 2009 issue (volume 42, issue 1).

Edited by the University of Oregon's Department of English, *Comparative Literature* has been the official journal of the American Comparative Literature Association for the past ten years. Not confined to a single national literature, the journal publishes wide-ranging scholarly articles that explore important issues of literary history and address significant problems in literary theory from a broad array of theoretical and critical approaches. Duke University Press will begin publishing *Comparative Literature* with the Winter 2009 issue (volume 61, issue 1).

All future content, as well as selected back content, for these titles will be accessible online through HighWire Press in 2009 at smallaxe.dukejournals.org, novel.dukejournals.org, and complit.dukejournals.org. Subscribers will be able to take advantage of HighWire's impressive array of features, including table-of-contents alerting, toll-free access across cited journals within HighWire's collection, RSS feeds, enhanced search features, and reference linking.
